November 16 Event Scheduled to Assist Unemployed Engineers

Vancouver, WA – Space is still available for the Engineering Employment Symposium on Monday at the Vancouver Hilton from 7:30 am – 2:00 pm. More than 200 engineers looking to better position themselves to find jobs or start their own company are expected to attend. The event is aimed at providing information and resources to engineers in transition so that they can successfully find employment in this tough economy.

Sponsored by regional workforce partners Southwest Washington Workforce Development Council, Worksystems, Inc., MTC Works, Workforce Investment Council of Clackamas County, and Enterprise for Employment & Education, the event offers expertise and counsel from more than two dozen industry and education representatives, entrepreneurs, and top level career coaching and talent management professionals on topics related to education and training, entrepreneurship, and job search strategies and skills. Aspiring entrepreneurs will have the chance to vet their ideas with experts from the Oregon Entrepreneur Network to get feedback on their potential viability.

"These engineers represent a huge talent pool for our region. It is important to us that we retain this talent in our region and do what we can to help them get back into the workforce quickly. The goal of these events is to help these engineering professionals retool, reinvent, and find employment, and ultimately remain within our community to provide our local employers with the talent they need to be competitive," said Lisa Nisenfeld, Executive Director of the SW Washington Workforce Development Council.

More than 300 engineers from Oregon and Southwest Washington, the majority of whom are unemployed and looking for work or wanting to start their own business, attended a similar event held Thursday in Tigard. Well-attended sessions, engaging dialogue, and rave reviews by attendees indicated that the attendees took away valuable information, tools, and perspectives. Many attendees have already signed up for the Vancouver event so that they can learn even more.



"It was a really valuable event," said Mark Simpson, a civil engineer who has been looking for work for a year and who attended Thursday's Symposium. "I got some excellent advice on about what I need to do to stand out in this competitive market and some inspiration to be optimistic about my next career opportunity. I will definitely put to use what I learned today as I prepare for several upcoming interviews."
