Reemployment services can help you get back to work faster. Attend a virtual session to learn about:

- **Healthcare resources** What to do when you're without health insurance. Washington residents can apply for low-cost Washington Basic Health plans.
- **Training and education options** Consider training or courses to expand your job skills and knowledge. Community College staff will guide you through the application process.
- **Unemployment insurance** Benefits may be available to help you meet expenses while you look for another job and are not based on financial need. Employment Security Department (ESD) will show you how and when to apply.
- Job hunting tools & resources Free resources including one-on-one career guidance, referrals
 to companies that are hiring and résumé writing assistance are available through WorkSource.
